Unconfirmed minutes of the 63rd Annual General Meeting of the Royal Agricultural University, Cirencester, Wednesday 13th March 2019.

1. Welcome

The Secretary, Rupert Caplat, opened the meeting by welcoming members, guests and Andy Newbold who was representing the IAgrE President and giving the President's address. 2019 AGM Chairman's address - 13th March 2019 RAU Cirencester

Here follows the 63rd Annual Western Branch AGM Chairmans address. I want to summarise the branch activities in the past year since the 2018 AGM also here at Cirencester. We've had a relatively busy year since then with some excellent and varied talks and visits arranged to satisfy a range of member interests. As something new for this year we've added a small slide show with photos from the events.

I say this every year, and this year's no different, but we are one of the more active Branches in the Institution which is due to the support of the Committee, Branch Members, our industry connections and our academic institutions who we rely on to host our meetings. I know we haven't met at Lackham for a considerable while now but moves are afoot to rebuild a relationship with them. Suggestions for visits and talks are always welcome from all members and not just the decisions of the committee. Please feel free always to call or email myself or the Secretary to let us know what you would like to see.

For the well attended 2018 AGM here we had the pleasure of the company of past President Mark Kibblewhite who gave the Presidential Address. This covered the efforts that the Institution are making to increase membership, continue to be relevant to the modern Agricultural Engineering, keep people informed through Landwards, journals and the website and provide training and accreditation to people in all walks of the Industry.

Afterwards we were honoured to invite Andrew Woolton and Rob Edwards of Kubota UK to give a presentation on their company's visions for Stage/Tier V engine emissions regulations and beyond.

It was interesting to see the huge advancements made in reducing particulates and NOx which is particularly at odds with the recent fall in popularity of diesel engines in the passenger car industry. It was interesting to see them offering gasoline/LPG engines into off-highway applications which had previously been 100% diesel. A long Q&A discussion followed late into the evening showing the interest this subject has for Branch members and guests.

In late May myself and Richard Robinson attended the 80th year AGM at Wrest Park, Silsoe. Awards were presented to many worthy recipients including Mzuri who were awarded the IVEL award for their Pro-Til Xzact drill – a company we would later go on to visit. Also a special 80th Anniversary award went to the Harper Adams Hand Free Hectare team - about which Kieran Walsh is kindly giving a presentation this evening. Another, less important, reason was for myself to receive a Branch Meritorious award but I won't go on about that. Each attendee was given a book detailing the work of the NIAE at Wrest Park over the years until its closure so if anyone would like to borrow my copy please let me know.

In June the committee held a meeting to discuss the 2018/19 season of events. I would iterate again please give us ideas for talks and visits to discuss at these meetings.

The first meeting of this new season was to Ramsbury Brewery and Distillery in Wiltshire which was well attended for obvious reasons. We were shown both the beer brewing and vodka/gin distilling operations by Head Brewer Viraj with opportunities to sample the produce at the end of each section. What was impressive is the self-reliance on the Ramsbury Estate for not only sourcing the barley and water but the processing of waste hot water and mash on site. I think with previous visits to both the Wadworth Brewery in Devizes and Thatchers in Somerset we have covered the processing of certain agricultural produce fairly comprehensively.

In late November, as mentioned earlier, we held a joint visit to Mzuri with West Midland branch. It seemed the polite thing to do as Mzuri are located in the Vale of Evesham so it was on their "patch". Also we had a good turn out of Harper Adams Engineering students who had travelled down from Newport for the afternoon. We were treated to a buffet and a very informative presentation by Ben Knight who is both the farm manager and a customer service manager for the products. This was followed by a farm tour with Ben explaining how the farm is used to evaluate various Min-Til drilling techniques and product development with the results right there on their doorstep. It was finished off with a tour of the assembly facilities.

Just recently we had the second visit of the Jim Wilkie travelling cinema at the Greyhound pub in Bromham. The first event two years ago was a great success so considering the wealth of old cine films Jim has we had to have him back again. Unfortunately I missed it due to being in Ireland with work but by all reports it was an enjoyable night. Jim showed films from Fiat – not only their tractors but Laverda combines and Braud grape harvesters.

A tractor demonstration film from the era when Ferguson and Massey Harris merged was shown along with a John Deere film from the 1930's. I must make a point of attending the inevitable third instalment, especially as Jim has around 2000 films in his possession (500 as far as his wife is concerened). I believe the above summarises an extensive and varied programme of events. If any member wishes to get further copies of the reports or photographs please let Branch secretary Mike Whiting know. Shortly I will hand over to Andy Newbold, past IAgrE President, who has very kindly come this evening to present the 2019 Presidential Address with all the latest news of the Institution and the good work it is doing. After that and a short break we will hand over to Kieran Walsh who has kindly offered to give a talk on the subject of the famous Hands Free Hectare at Harper Adams. Lastly I'd like to thank you all, committee, RAU staff, representatives of Institute HQ and other gathered members and guests for your support in the last year and for attending this AGM. In particular the support of Mike, Nick, Nigel, Tom and Richard in organising these visits without whom the branch would not be what it is.
